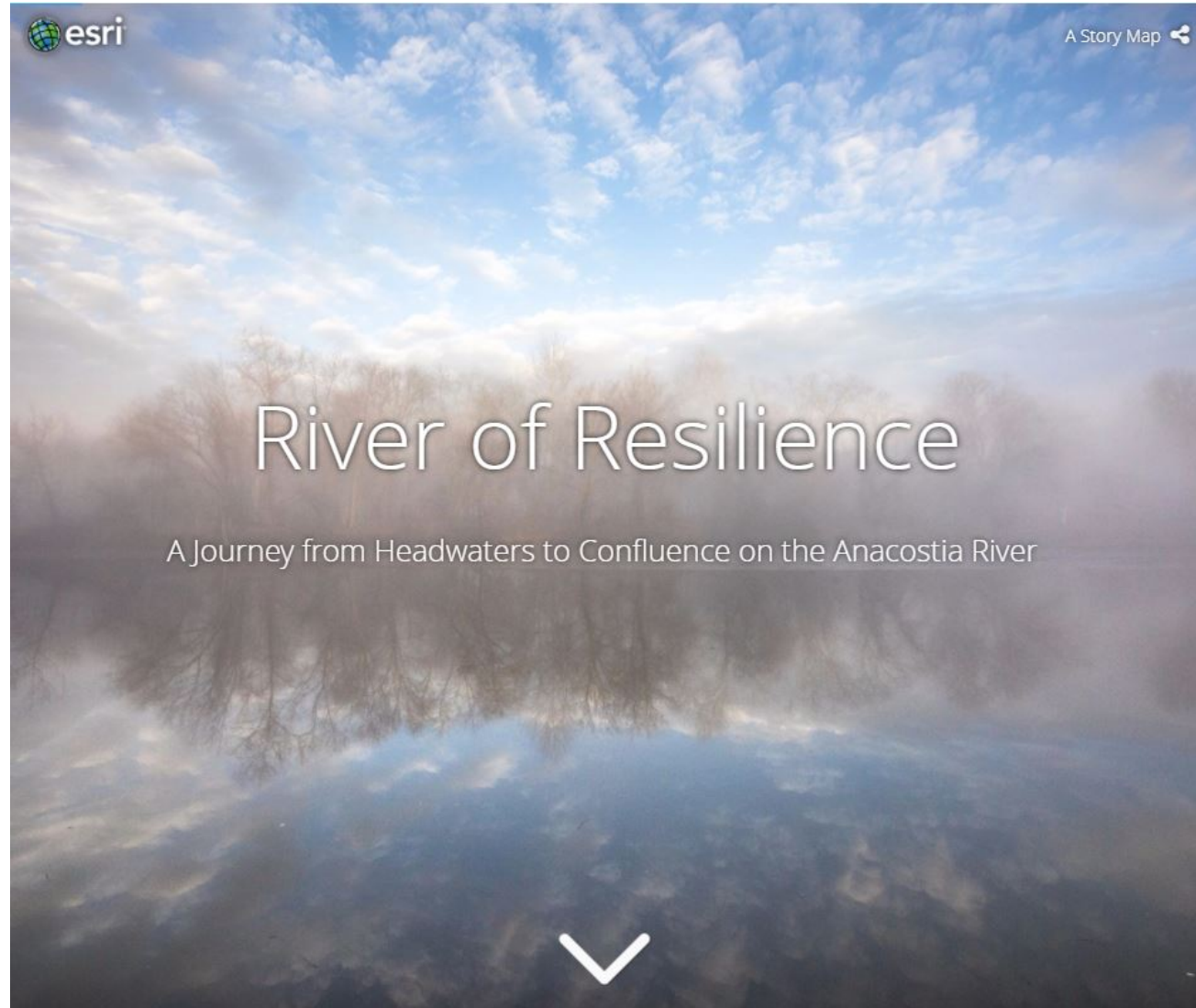

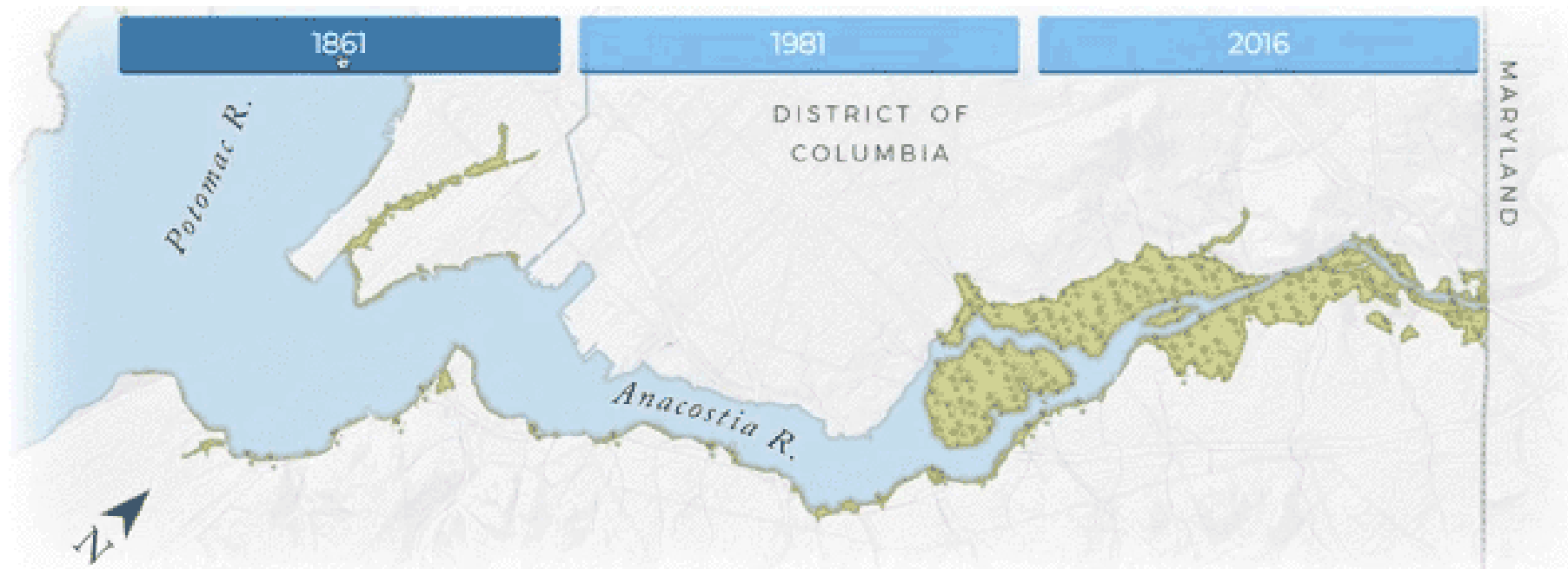

River of Resilience Story Map



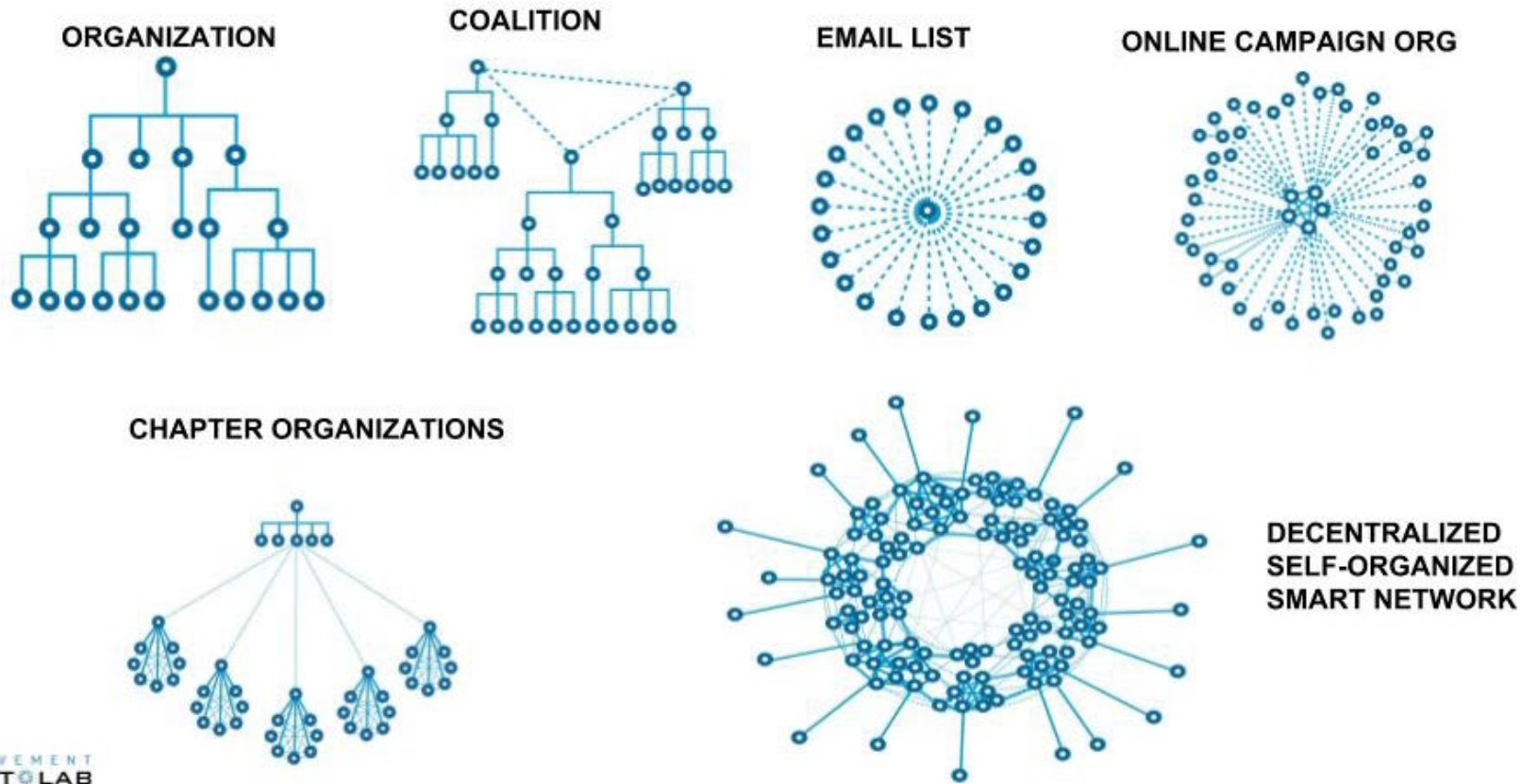

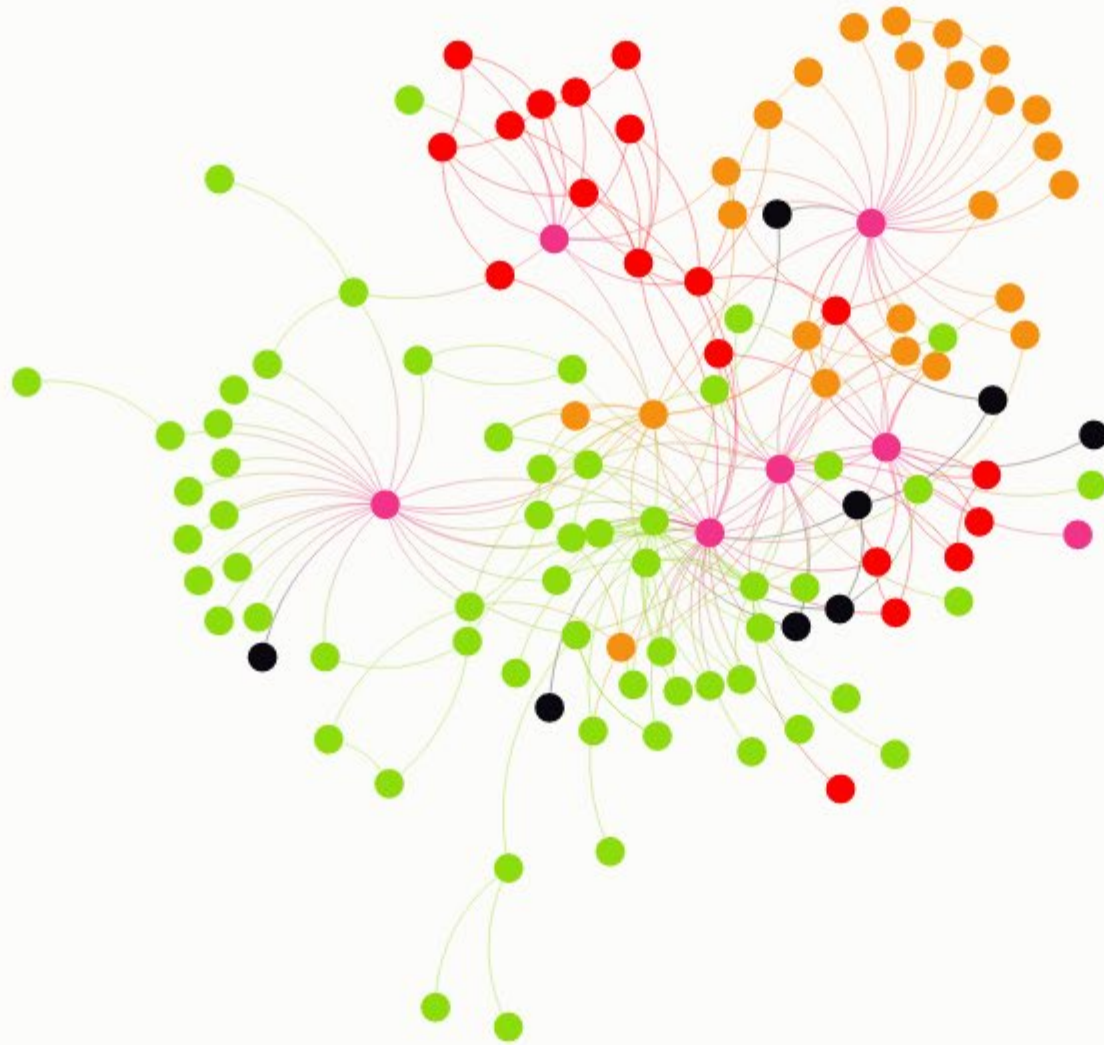
